

## **MESSAGE FROM GOVERNOR DOUG JARDINE**

Country artist Kenny Chesney has a song titled, "Don't Blink." It's the truth. It seems like only yesterday I was sworn in as the Kansas District Governor, and suddenly the year is over. I had several goals. Did I achieve any of them? No. But I tried and that's all I can say. We will not finish plus in membership for the district. We did not start a new club; in fact, we lost three. I did not visit every club in the district, but I will continue to work on that one as past governor. I did not convince every club to attend at least one district meeting even after offering clubs a \$100 stipend to send a member. Did we have successes? Yes of course we did.

We started the year off with a great district meeting hosted by the McPherson Optimist Club. Jamie Menon, a community vitality specialist with K-State Research and Extension, introduced attendees to the Kansas Pride Program, which promotes an enhanced quality of life for citizens of Kansas communities through education, leadership, development, and recognition. Deborah Kohl, Program Leader Coordinator for Community Vitality, shared resources available from K-State that help residents and all communities – rural, suburban, and urban – grow and prosper.

The second quarterly district meeting was held jointly with the West Missouri District in Overland Park. A highlight of the meeting was a visit from Middle America Vice President Julie Robison.

The third quarter district meeting was held in Emporia and featured the district Oratorical Contest. Attendees heard four very high-quality speeches from the contestants. The keynote speaker was Jeff King, Founder of the Transmuto Company, who did a presentation on the Ennneagram, a powerfully effective personality typing system that empowers people toward personal growth, relationship effectiveness, and professional development.

The final district meeting was the annual convention held in Manhattan on what turned out to be the hottest day of the year in Manhattan. Attendees heard from Michael Finnegan, an associate professor in the K-State Staley School of Leadership, who impressed upon us the powerful value of positive phrasing in our conversations. Sarah Maas, State Leader for Kansas 4-H Youth Development, shared information on the depth and breadth of Kansas 4-H programs and how Optimists might better engage with 4-H programs in their communities. Finally, Dave Bruns, past Optimist International President, provided us a brief history of Optimism in Kansas. New district officers were sworn in, and incoming governor Judy Morris shared what she hoped to achieve in the coming year.

Overall, I believe that it was a very successful year for Kansas Optimism. However, it should be noted that if current declines in membership continue, Optimist International as an entity will cease to exist in the next 20 years. So please, ask someone to join your club. Your clubs survival depends on it!

#### KANSAS DISTRICT OPTIMIST CHILDHOOD CANCER GOLF TOURNAMENT

The Kansas District Optimists held their 15th Annual Childhood Cancer Golf Tournament on Monday, August 7 at Prairie Highlands Golf Course in Olathe. A field of 140 golfers participated in the event which raises money to send children with cancer for a free week of summer camp. #### ORATORICAL CONTEST

As your club decides on activities for the upcoming year make plans to hold a club Oratorical Contest. The topic for the 2023-2024 year is "How to Change the World with Optimism". The winner of your club's contest will enter your Zone Oratorical Contest and Zone winners move on to compete for \$5,000 in college scholarships in the Kansas District Oratorical Contest to be held next spring. The 1st place winner of the District contest receives a \$2,500 scholarship, and will then go to the Regional/World competition in St. Louis next summer. 2nd and 3rd place District winner receive \$1,500 and \$1,000 scholarships. Regional winners are given a \$5,000 college scholarship and compete in the World Contest. The 1st place winner in the World Competition receives a \$15,000 scholarship, the 2nd place winner a \$10,000 scholarship, and the 3rd place winner a \$5,000 scholarship. The Oratorical Contest is an excellent way for students in your community to develop their speaking skills and compete for scholarship monies. 


## **CCDHH**

The Communication Contest for the Deaf and Hard of Hearing (CCDHH) offers young people through grade 12 who are deaf or hard of hearing the opportunity to express their thoughts to an audience either through signing or speaking. This year's topic is "How to Change the World with Optimism". The Optimist Internation Foundation funds a \$2,500 scholarship to any District that meets the participation criteria for the contest. The Kansas District also offers a second scholarship up to \$2,500 whenever funds are available. As with the other scholarship competitions, clubs can find information on how to conduct a CCDHH contest on the Kansas District website (Ksoptimist.org) or the Optimist International website(optimist.org). # Kids Speak Out

Optimist International offers clubs a simple way to get younger students involved in public speaking. Speak Out offers a "pre-oratorical" program for boys and girls to gain experience speaking to an audience. The program is not backed by scholarship money and does not focus on "who wins". Winners can be selected, but emphasis should be placed on participation. There is only one level of competition which is at the club or local level. Presentations are made in classrooms before the students' classmates. Optimist club members can be in attendance, if the teacher agrees. Information on how to hold a Kids Speak Out Program can be found on the Optimist International website (optimist.org) along with the Oratorical Contest materials.

The 4th quarter District Convention was highlighted by a wonderful response to OI Foundation fund raising!
