BIRTHDAYS: None this week.


ANNOUNCEMENTS:

There are 150 students who attend classes in plant and animal science. The school's greenhouse has been upgraded and support donated flowers from local businesses for the Viking Floral shop. Floral arrangements, boutonnieres, and corsages for school prom are made and sold to school staff and students. The shop has 120 monthly subscribers with orders that are delivered. Students potted 500 plant plugs during one class period which was amazing. Plant towers provide vegetables for the school lunches. Fifteen chickens provide 15 eggs per day. A dozen eggs are sold for \$3 and there's a long waiting list for eggs. Students also became eligible to adopt mustang horses and one student's horse became a state qualifier. Care of livestock and agricultural farming is available when parents of FFA students are engaged in that industry.

Madison Koenen grew up in Northeast Colorado but chose to attend K-State. Students spend on average 10 hours/wk on FFA meetings, projects, and fund raisers.
