and ether were available during the Civil War when a doctor would wet a horse hair in his mouth to thread the needle for a suture. Gas would take effect quickly and the patient would recover quickly. When Don was gaining experience using gas, a doctor would tell Don that he wasn't finished. When a muscle relaxant was developed, it helped with abdominal surgery and intestines didn't bulge out. Use of a pulse oximeter helped reverse the annual 50% increases in malpractice insurance during the 1980s. The FDA required audible signals to monitor patient stability.

Don grew up in northwest Oklahoma, near Enid. Harvesting wheat on an aged combine with no canopy motivated him to finish school. He completed anesthesia school in 1981, worked in Wichita when the hospital had one ventilator, joined the Naval Reserves and served in Desert Storm, and lived in Topeka for 27 years and worked at Stormont Vail hospital. He recalls regularly using a bag ventilator for up to 3 hours during surgery and charting blood pressure manually.
